According to Le Mauricien of 23 November 2024 the above headline was a statement made by former PM Pravind Jugnauth on the crushing defeat of his Alliance Lepep at the poll on 10 November 2024. Now is the time for the l'Alliance du Changement to get ready to deliver, dessan lor pie, as they say in the Mauritian vernacular.. If there is any delay, as could be expected, it is not their fault. They have inherited a dirty and messy stable, which they have to clean up first. This can take months.

On the local radios, questioned about his expectations, one young person, said he wanted to have **free internet** access, as his priority. Another person wants **free medication** prescribed by his private doctor. One almost permanently unemployed middleaged man wants to know when he will have **free transport** to be able to go about job-hunting. Questioned on TV, one local woman wanted "**pani**", "**dilo**" which Minister Lesjongard failed them in spite of all their past efforts.

One can go on and on with the litanies of complaints and expectations in store for the new government to tackle, Let us for example talk about the 14th month salary promised to the workers during the electoral *surenchère*. The trade unions are taking about the **salary readjustment**. Car owners want the reduction in the price of petrol and are even talking about the **VAT cut-down**. *Old Age Pension* will go up to Rs 21,500 per month. On that score the government does not to worry too much as they five years ahead of them to deal with this promise.

The present government as the previous one needs money. The new adminstration has begun by telling the people that the kitty is empty and a proper *état de lieu* is taking place to find out the extent of the rot. The previous government did mention that billions of rupees would be forthcoming from the US as Diego Garcia rent money.

The problem is that the British are at present talking to an American administration which will be overridden once Mr Donald Trump takes office in January next. He is the sort of a man who does not give two hoots about any agreement to restore the Chagos back to Mauritius's jurisdiction.

It has been intimated that if Trump is forced to accept the agreement between Britain and Mauritius, he may still default on payment of the rent money. It is hoped that he will relent and not use this strategy to have his way.
