Diabetes and Vascular Centre inaugurated at Floreal Mediclinic

A new Diabetes and Vascular Centre was inaugurated on 15 June at Floreal Mediclinic, marking a significant step towards enhancing specialised healthcare services for patients living with diabetes and vascular diseases in Mauritius.

The opening ceremony was held in presence of the Minister of Health and Wellness, Mr Anil Kumar Bachoo. The Minister of Financial Services and Economic Planning, Dr (Mrs) Jyoti Jeetun, the Minister of Arts and Culture, Mr Mahendra Gondeea as well as other personalities were present.

The Centre has been established to provide comprehensive and integrated care through a multidisciplinary approach encompassing the prevention, diagnosis, treatment and management of diabetes and vascular conditions. The initiative aims to improve patient outcomes and reduce complications associated with non-communicable diseases.

In a statement, Minister Bachoo recalled that provisions had been made in the Budget 2024–2025 for the establishment of specialised diabetes centres across the regional hospitals in Mauritius. He highlighted that diabetes remains a major public health concern, affecting approximately 20 per cent of the population. He further noted that around 700 amputations are performed annually due to diabetes-related complications, a figure he described as alarming for a small island nation. The Minister pointed out that three Diabetes and Vascular Centres are already operational at Sir Anerood Jugnauth Hospital, Sir Seewoosagur Ramgoolam National Hospital and Dr A.G. Jeetoo Hospital. With the inauguration of the Floreal Mediclinic facility, the number of centres has now increased



to four. He further announced that a fifth centre is expected to be inaugurated shortly in the vicinity of Rose Belle Hospital.

Minister Bachoo expressed confidence that the network of

specialised centres would strengthen the management of diabetes and vascular diseases, contribute to reducing the number of amputations, and improve the quality of life of patients in Mauritius.

Today, in my capacity as Secretary of the Mauritius Bar Council, I had the privilege of meeting Steven Thiru, President of the Commonwealth Lawyers Association, together with fellow members of the Mauritius Bar Council, at the seat of the Council.

The meeting provided an excellent opportunity for a frank and constructive exchange on a range of issues affecting the legal profession both in Mauritius and across the Commonwealth. We discussed the importance of maintaining the independence of the Bar and the legal profession, which remains a cornerstone of the rule of law and the proper administration of justice.

Particular attention was also given to contemporary challenges facing lawyers, including the rapid growth of

social media and artificial intelligence. While these developments offer significant opportunities for greater access to legal information and enhanced efficiency in legal practice, they also raise important questions relating to professional ethics, confidentiality, misinformation, reputation management, and the preservation of professional standards.

Our discussions further touched upon the recent international support for the Council of Europe Convention for the Protection of the Profession of Lawyer (Luxembourg Convention), a landmark treaty designed to protect lawyers from undue interference, threats, intimidation, harassment, and violence in the discharge of their professional duties. The Convention represents a significant step forward in

strengthening protections for legal practitioners and safeguarding the independence of the profession.

We were particularly honoured that the Mauritius Bar Council was invited to consider joining the Commonwealth Lawyers Association as a member organisation. Such an affiliation would further strengthen ties with the wider Commonwealth legal community and create valuable op-

portunities for collaboration, professional development, and the exchange of best practices.

The meeting was both enriching and inspiring. It reaffirmed the importance of a strong, independent, and forward-looking legal profession capable of adapting to emerging challenges while remaining steadfast in its commitment to justice, ethics, and the rule of law.



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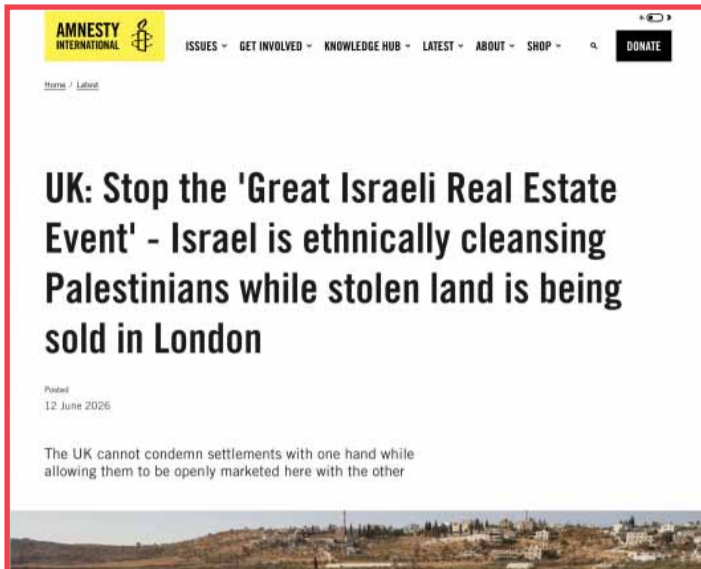
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Israel is Selling Stolen Palestinian Lands at Auction in London

The 'Great Israeli Real Estate Event' is a travelling roadshow that has held events across North America and is now coming to London. It comes as a new Amnesty report published this week lays bare Israel's state-led ethnic cleansing campaign in the West Bank – documenting the displacement of at least 5,910 Palestinian Bedouin and herding community members since 2023, the demolition of over 3,400 homes and structures in Area C, and an unprecedented surge in state-backed settler violence and land grabs.

WEST KIRBY WELCOMES AUTHOR T. M. LOGAN AS PART OF THE NATIONAL CRIME READING MONTH

West Kirby, Merseyside, is a seaside town located on the north-west tip of the Wirral Peninsula, where the River Dee meets the Irish Sea.

Every June, Wirral Libraries hosts National Crime Reading month, inviting crime writers to talk about their books. This year's programme also included a special talk on the history of forensic toxicology and how Agatha Christie used poison in her novels, along with a range of other activities.

I happened to be in West Kirby on 2 June, the same day that T. M. Logan, the multi-million-selling thriller writer and four-time Sunday Times bestselling author of *The Holiday*, *The Catch*, *Trust Me* and *The Daughter*, was at West Kirby Library to talk about his writing career and his latest thriller, *The Weekend*.

I have to admit I had neither read any of his books nor seen the television adaptations of

The *Holiday* starring Jill Halfpenny, or *The Catch*, starring Jason Watkins, both a four-part series for Channel 5. However, as an avid reader and someone who loves writing, I bought a ticket to his talk.

As I entered, refreshments were being offered and Logan himself was already mingling with the audience and chatting with attendees. The people I spoke to were devoted fans and had bought copies of his books to be signed after the Q & A session. When I asked which of his novels was their favourite, they couldn't choose because they loved them all equally. That must be a wonderful compliment for any author.

Interestingly, when Logan was asked the same question, he also found it difficult to pick a favourite, saying that he liked each book for different reasons.

Before becoming a full-time novelist, T.M.Logan worked in journalism and communications. He was a reporter and education correspondent on the Nottingham Evening Post before moving to London to work as a reporter for the Daily Mail. Later, he became a press officer and eventually Deputy Director of Communications at the University of Nottingham.

Like many aspiring authors, he wrote in whatever spare time he could find.

His family has been a constant source of inspiration. Logan explained that the idea for *The Holiday* came from his wife's annual holidays with three close friends. It made him think about lifelong friendships and what might

cause one friend to betray the others. That question became the seed for the psychological thriller that followed.

One piece of advice he offered aspiring writers was to find a good literary agent. A good agent does far more than pitch books to publishers. They assess manuscripts, negotiate contracts, seek out opportunities and sell translation, audiobooks, television and film rights. Most importantly, they protect their client's interests.

He also stressed the importance of perseverance. Rejection, he said, is part and parcel of becoming a novelist. His determination paid off, and he is now one of the UK's most successful thriller writers.

After the talk, I bought a copy of *Lies*. I found it very readable, very relatable, with a story that quickly draws the reader in. It makes great poolside reading.

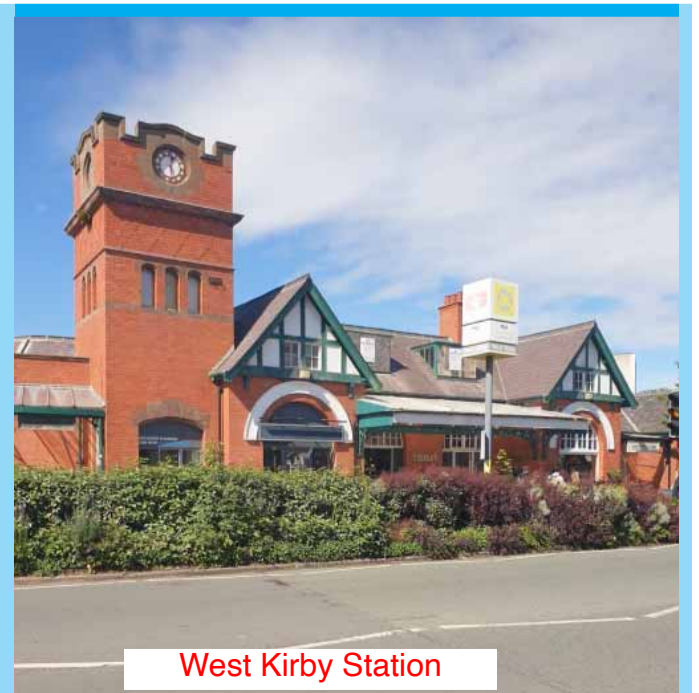
Originally a small fishing and farming village, West Kirby changed dramatically when the railway arrived in the late nineteenth century, turning it into a popular seaside resort.

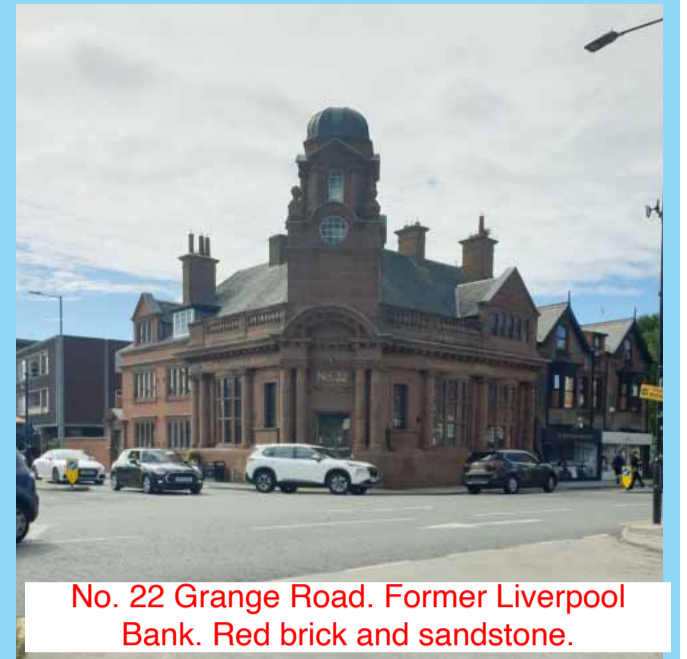

Que faire de cet Eléphant Blanc qu'est le Théâtre de Port-Louis? La Grande Horloge de Port-Louis n'y est plus depuis

quelques années. On l'a retirée quand on a réalisé que la structure était devenue dangereuse avec le temps. Vont-ils la remplacer ou pas? La nouvelle nous le dira.

La ville Port-Louis est presque dépeuplée. Il n'y a presque plus de résidents pour justifier une bibliothèque publique digne d'une cité comme nous avions dans le temps sous M. France Grancourt ou M. Edouard Maunick. On peut même se demander où se trouve la bibliothèque du Musée de Port-Louis de ma jeunesse?

Les Toilettes Publiques étaient payantes "to spend a penny". Il fallait mettre un "penny" dans le Pay Slot de la porte pour pouvoir entrer dans une toilette en Angleterre.
